

Why Do Catholics Do That?

One of my favorite feast days of the Church is that of the Birth of St. John the Baptist on June 24th. This feast day is different from most others because it marks his birth and not his death – Mary is the only other saint with a birth day celebration on the Church calendar. In addition, his birth day celebration is strategically placed by the Church to emphasize his role in God's great plan.

The beginning of the Gospel of Luke is the only account of John's birth. John's father, Zechariah, was a Jewish priest, and he and his wife Elizabeth were quite old. When Zechariah took his turn offering prayers and incense at the temple one day, the angel Gabriel appeared to him to give him the good news that he would have a son named John, and Zechariah just could not contain his disbelief, so Gabriel took away his power of speech until John was born.

When Elizabeth was six months pregnant, Gabriel visited Mary to let her know she would be the mother of the Son of God, and also that Elizabeth had conceived a son, for nothing is impossible with God. At this point, Mary set off to visit her cousin, and John leapt with joy in his mother's womb in the presences of Jesus. The Feast of the Annunciation, celebrating this visit by Gabriel, is on March 25, three months before the celebration of his birth. It is also placed six months before Christmas to emphasize that John prepared the way for Jesus.

But what I like most about this feast day is that it is placed just a few days after the Summer Solstice, which is on June 21st. This day has the longest period of daylight of the year; the following six months have a shortening of the length of days, echoing the words of John the Baptist, "He must increase and I must decrease." Then, near Christmas, the daylight hours reach their shortest and begin increasing right before our celebration of Jesus' birth!

Of course we do not know the actual birthdates of John the Baptist and Jesus, but I think it beautiful that those in the early Church so carefully thought out John's feast day and placed it to emphasize who he was, and that he was six months older than Jesus. As he prepares the world for Jesus Christ, his light decreases, and then Jesus' light increases beginning right before Christmas and into the Easter Season.

This year, John's feast day is on a Sunday. In many places in Europe, there is a custom of lighting fires on the eve of John's birthday – bonfires are lit on hilltops all over the countryside in Scandinavia, France, Spain, and Italy. In Florence, the celebration of John's birth lasts three days! Perhaps this would be a good night for a bonfire or marshmallow roast in his honor! I do hope you celebrate his day well, and keep in mind his words as we open our hearts to make room for Christ.



For all priests and deacons, living or deceased, on this month of ordination anniversaries, that God will keep them close and give them the peace of mind of a job well done.

For our graduates, from our grade school and those in our parish graduating from other schools, that as they take the next step in their lives that they will ask God for guidance.

For the teachers and administration at St. Martin of Tours school, that they will be renewed and refreshed over the summer break.

That St. Barnabas, whose feast day is June 11th, will help and guide us in establishing peace in our homes, in our communities, in our nation, and in our world.

St. Anthony of Padua, whose feast day is June 13th, is a patron of lost things, lost souls and lost spiritual goods. Especially on this feast day, let us pray that the lost be guided back to the path given to us by Jesus.

During this month containing the feast day of St. Aloysius Gonzaga, let us pray especially for our young people, that they will be safe from harm during the summer break, and that they keep love for God in their hearts.

Just as St. John the Baptist (feast June 24) noted: "He must increase, but I must decrease," let us all pray for humility in our own hearts, that we take on more and more the mantle of Christ.

During this month of the feast of Saints Peter and Paul (June 29) and the feast of the First Martyrs of the Church (June 30), let us pray for those martyred for their faith, especially those killed this past year.

For an increase in vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

For those being called to become Catholic this year, that they will hear the call of the Holy Spirit and will find a home in our RCIA program.

That our civic leaders will work for issues of social justice, creating a society of freedom and fairness for all.

For all our parish volunteers and staff, that they be given joyful hearts as they carry out the work of the Church.

For the intentions in our Memorial Mass Fund book, those prayers entrusted to our Prayer Chain, and all the special intentions of our parishioners.
